### **Step Seven**

The Seventh Step is where we make the change in our attitude which permits us, with humility as our guide, to move out from ourselves toward others and toward God. The whole emphasis of Step Seven is on humility. It is really saying to us that we now ought to be willing to try humility in seeking the removal of our other shortcomings just as we did when we admitted that we were powerless over alcohol, and came to believe that Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity. If that degree of humility could enable us to find the grace by which such a deadly obsession could be banished, then there must be hope of the same result respecting any other problem we could possibly have.

July 1-3, 1960 - 8700 attend 25th Anniversary of AA in Long Beach, CA

July 2

1965 - Best of Bill and Pocket-Sized 12 and 12 1st sold

**1993 -** 50 years of AA celebrated in Canada

2000 - 20 Millionth Big Book given to Al-Anon in Minneapolis

July 2-3, 1955 - Bill W turns "the fellowship over to the fellowship" at 4:00 PM, 5000 attend 20th Anniversary at our St Louis Convention

July 2-4, 1965 - 10,000 attend 30th Anniversary of AA in Toronto. There we came to own our Responsibility Declaration

July 4, 1939 - 1st AA meeting started in Flatbush, NY

July 3-5, 1970 - 10,900 attend 35th Anniversary of AA in Miami. Bill W gave his last talk to AA

July 3-6, 1980 - 22,500 attend 45th Anniversary of AA in New Orleans First true marathon meeting was held here

July 4, 1999 - He who has a fifth on the fourth may not come forth on the fifth...

July 4-6, 1975 - 19,800 attend 40th Anniversary of AA in Denver Worlds largest coffee server serves 1/2 million cups a day

## "Fortress Twelve"

Back in the mid eighties when I arrived at Alcoholics Anonymous, my sponsor took me to a meeting in the Boyertown know as the "Fortress Twelve". The gentleman, who built this unique place, used his own funds to show his appreciation for what AA had given him! Life...

Upon my first entry between a double large black swing gate before 2 beautiful white stone pillars they were attached to, I drove up the driveway to what looked like a four car garage. On entering the large beautiful building, were comfortable chairs and a nice thick sturdy table before me. Many people made it a point to get out of their seats and welcomed me. As being quite new to the program, I was overwhelmed at the authenticity of their smiles, handshakes, hugs and the real feeling that I belonged! These folks talked about the solution to my problem(s), alcohol and living problems.

After the meeting was over, I was surrounded again by people who spoke with me candidly, gave me their phone number and invited me back.

As we left the meeting I noticed outside across the way a bit, a beautiful white small building that stood in the middle of the property. I was completely amazed. It was a castle, Hence the name, "Fortress Twelve". {Castle > Fortress + 12 Steps} I couldn't wait to come back again for another meeting there.

The man in the red shirt and black vest facing the camera under the word powerful is the man who built "Fortress 12" for all to recover. His name is Phil W. I am honored to have known him and everyone I met there and for the feeling that I finally "fit" somewhere. Thank you, Mr. Phil W. This place as many others were very instrumental in my early sobriety.

I only remember the names of a few of these folks, so if anyone sees this photo and happens to add to this memory of mine, please do so.
